

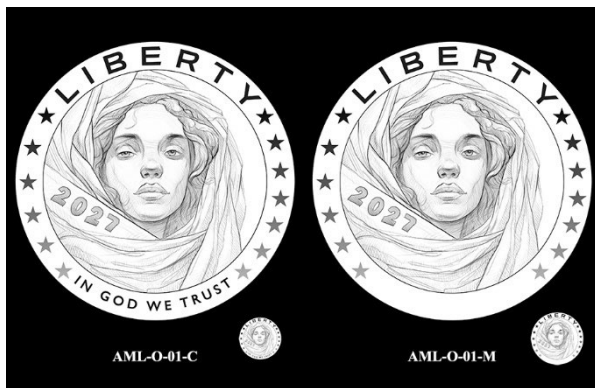
2027 American Liberty 24-karat High Relief Gold Coin and Silver Medal Design Descriptions

The United States Mint (Mint) launched the American Liberty 24k High Relief Gold Coin and Silver Medal program in 2015. The Secretary of the Treasury authorized the program based on the Mint's statutory authority to issue gold coins and silver medals. Designs for this biennial program feature modern depictions of Liberty on the obverse and an American eagle on the reverse.

For 2027, the Mint will issue a 1 oz. 24k gold coin (1.205 inches) and a .9999 fine silver medal (1.598 inches).

Obverse

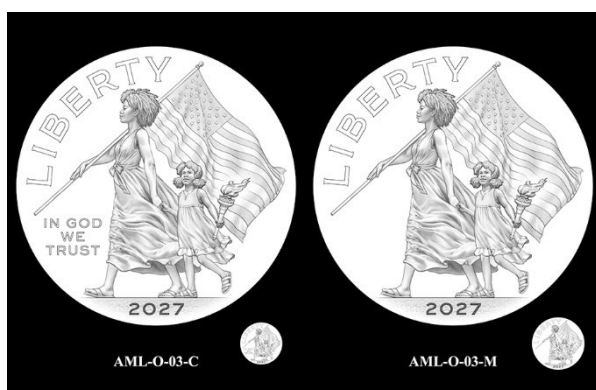
Required inscriptions for the gold coin obverse designs are "LIBERTY," "IN GOD WE TRUST," and "2027." The corresponding silver medal obverse will have "2027," with the optional inscription "LIBERTY." Designs are presented side-by-side in both their gold coin and silver medal versions.



AML-O-01-C and **AML-O-01-M** depict Liberty gazing at the viewer with quiet strength and resolve. Her flowing drapery, which also symbolizes freedom, is inspired by the sculptural work of Augustus Saint-Gaudens, a revered American artist of the classical tradition. The composition evokes both the protective structure of the living Constitution and the enduring spirit it defends.



AML-O-02-C, AML-O-02-M, AML-O-02A-C, and AML-O-02A-M present Liberty with a magnificent crown of spikes and laurels, with flowing hair that fills the lower part of the design.



AML-O-03-C and AML-O-03-M depict Liberty walking with a young girl while holding the American flag. The girl holds a torch representing enduring freedom.



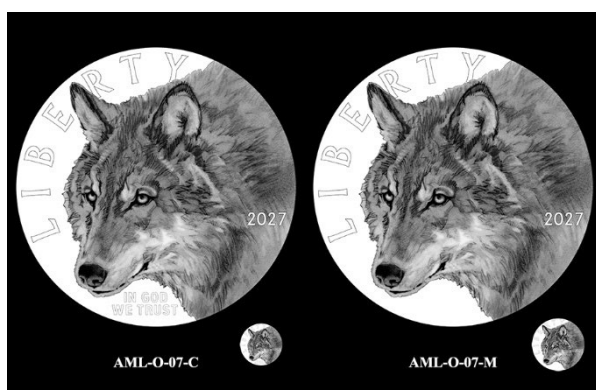
AML-O-04-C and AML-O-04-M show a formline butterfly design. The wing is on the right side, while the thorax and head are on the left side. The design takes inspiration from the butterfly's transformation in its pupa stage, a time of change and possibility.



AML-O-05-C and **AML-O-05-M** depict a futuristic Liberty with planet Earth in the background.



AML-O-06-C and **AML-O-06-M** depict Pegasus, the winged horse from Greek mythology. In contemporary symbolism, Pegasus often represents liberty and freedom, whereas early Americans chose to depict the Roman goddess Libertas.



AML-O-07-C and **AML-O-07-M** showcase the gray wolf, once effectively eradicated from Yellowstone National Park. In 1995 gray wolves were reintroduced into Yellowstone National Park. A total of 41 wolves were released over three years into Northwestern Wyoming and Central Idaho. Since then, the population has grown to roughly 100 wolves, existing in 10 separate packs. Their return to Yellowstone has brought its fragile ecosystem back into a balance

that had been missing for almost 100 years, an example of the restoration of liberty to the natural world.



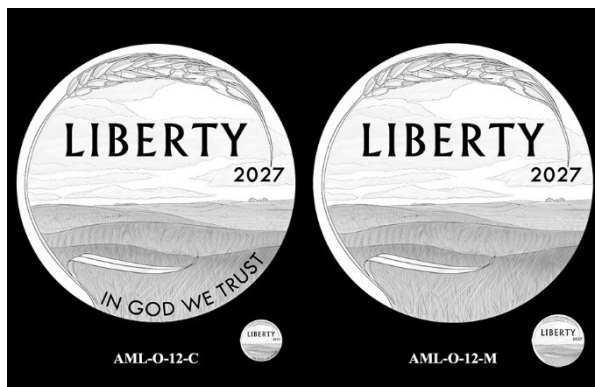
AML-O-08-C, AML-O-08-M, AML-O-09-C, and AML-O-09-M depict a youthful Liberty, a confident and aspirational vision of American liberty. Draped in flowing garments and adorned with a garland of flowers or cascading stars, she embodies a sense of liberty that is hopeful and dynamic. The 13 stars in each design honor the original colonies, grounding Liberty in the enduring promise of the American experiment



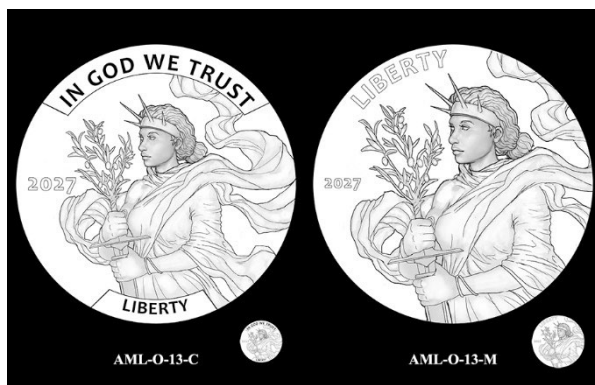
AML-O-10-C, AML-O-10-M, AML-O-10A-C, AML-O-10A-M, AML-O-10B-C, and AML-O-10B-M portray Liberty as a modern American woman with a shaved head and leather jacket. The leather motorcycle jacket, originally designed in New York, NY in 1928, is an iconic American symbol. Liberty exemplifies freedom of expression.



AML-O-11-C and **AML-O-11-M** show Liberty with a radiant sun behind her. She wears a wreath of olive branches around her head, while holding fasces in one hand and a cornucopia in the other. The fasces symbolize the unity of Americans, while the cornucopia represents the abundance of America that enriches us.



AML-O-12-C and **AML-O-12-M** allude to Liberty by showcasing the beauty and freedom of the American landscape.



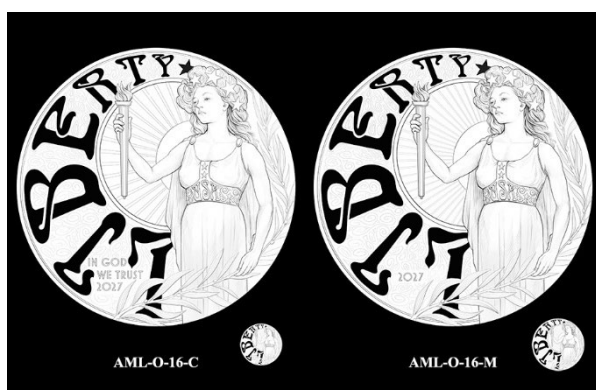
AML-O-13-C and **AML-O-13-M** feature a crowned Liberty holding an olive branch and sheathed sword, the drapery of her dress billowing as she advances forward.



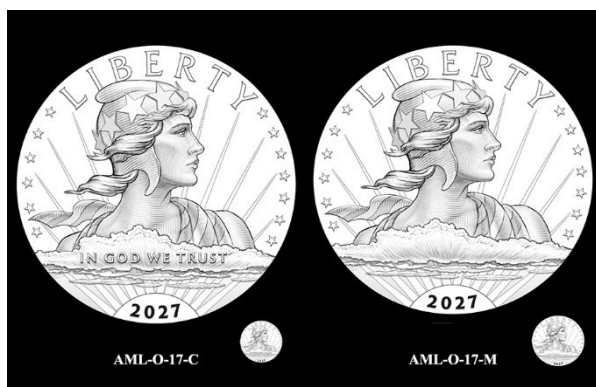
AML-O-14-C and **AML-O-14-M** depict a mother bird attending to her chicks as they learn to fly, a symbol of thriving families through American liberty.



AML-O-15-C and **AML-O-15-M** show a floating wooden ship in the clouds sailing among the stars, representative of the enduring spirit of exploration and freedom possible through American liberty. The sails display 50 stripes, while 13 stars appear in the sky.



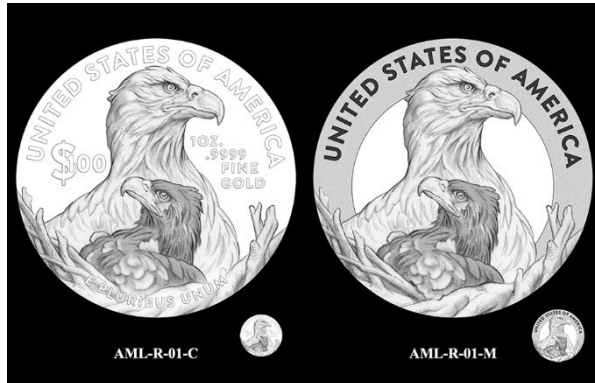
AML-O-16-C and **AML-O-16-M** present Liberty holding a torch and olive branch with a sun burst in the center back.



AML-O-17-C and **AML-O-17-M** show Liberty with a cap and flowing hair, above the clouds, with the rays of the sun in the background.

Reverse

Reverse designs all depict an American eagle. Required inscriptions for the gold coin are “UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,” “E PLURIBUS UNUM,” “1 oz.,” “.9999 FINE GOLD,” and the denomination, “\$100.” The corresponding silver medal may optionally include the inscription “UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.” Designs are presented in both their gold coin and silver medal versions.



AML-R-01-C and AML-R-01-M feature an adult eagle with an eaglet in the nest.



AML-R-02-C and AML-R-02-M feature a stylized eagle facing the viewer.



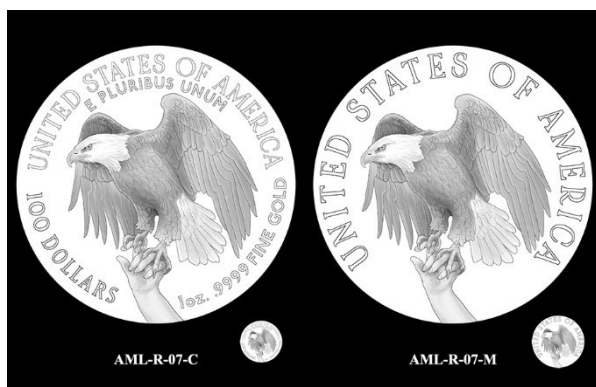
AML-R-03-C, AML-R-03-M, AML-R-04-C, and AML-R-04-M feature formline depictions of an eagle. **AML-R-03** includes the sun and moon, and part of the eagle is also a raven. The eagle represents strength and nobility, while the raven symbolizes cleverness; their combined traits maintain balance.



AML-R-05-C and AML-R-05-M depict a bald eagle as an icon of freedom proudly looking up into the night sky with the moon and stars.



AML-R-06-C and AML-R-06-M depict a close-up view of an eagle in flight.



AML-R-07-C and **AML-R-07-M** depict an eagle held high on Liberty's hand.



AML-R-08-C and **AML-R-08-M** draws inspiration from Adolf Weinman's many carved eagles that originally sat atop Penn Station in New York. The eagle here appears with subtle laurels surrounding its head, a symbol of strength and beauty, while maintaining a watchful eye.



AML-R-09-C and **AML-R-09-M** feature a close-up depiction of eagles parenting an eaglet in the nest.



AML-R-10-C and AML-R-10-M display a swooping eagle holding an olive branch and a snake, symbolizing peace in the face of adversity.



AML-R-11-C and AML-R-11-M feature an alert bald eagle perched on top of a rock.
