So 14 hearing none, the next order of business is actually a 15 great joy for all of us. It is the presentation of the Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee Public Service 16 Award to Robin Salmon in recognition of her loyal and 17 18 outstanding service. 19 Deputy Director McNally will be presenting this award to Robin in just a few moments, 20 2.1 and Robin is joining us virtually. 2.2 And before I turn it over to Deputy

Director McNally, I would like to say to Robin and everybody who is with us that it really is a great pleasure to see you again, if only virtually on the big screen. The time the two of us served on the Committee together seemed far too short.

And your presence on the Committee has been sorely missed in the year plus since we saw you last, especially before the measured, really sharp observations and comments you always brought to our discussions, not to mention your very good humor and company, and with that I'll turn it over now to Deputy Director McNally.

MS. MCNALLY: Good morning, everyone. Appointed to the CCAC in October 2018, Robin Salmon served as a member specifically qualified in sculpture or medallic arts.

Ms. Salmon is the President of Art and Historical Collections and Curator of Sculptures at Brookgreen Gardens where she directs acquisition, documentation, exhibition, and conservation of Brookgreen's art, history, library, and archives collections.

1 The activity of the Carroll A. Campell, 2 Jr., Center for American Sculpture at Brookgreen 3 Gardens, and the Brookgreen Medallic Arts Program. 4 Robin has received several awards over the years, 5 including the National Sculpture Society's Medal of Honor in recognition for her work. As a member of the 6 7 CCAC, Robin was extremely committed to the work of 8 this Committee. 9 Specifically, she served on the Working 10 Group Subcommittee in fiscal years 2021 and 2022, to 11 consider theme ideas and provide recommendations back 12 to the full Committee, and also the recent Liberty and 13 Britannia Working Group. Ms. Salmon's last meeting 14 was March 1, 2023. 15 And today we're honoring her for her service to the CCAC, the Mint and the Department of 16 17 Treasury, presenting her with the Citizens Coinage 18 Advisory Committee for Public Service Award. 19 The Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee Public Service Award recognizes the contribution of 20 2.1 the member of the CCAC who honorably served the public 2.2 interest by advising the Secretary of the Treasury on

theme and design proposals related to circulating 1 2 coinage, bullion coinage, numismatic coinage, Congressional Gold Medals, and National Medals 3 4 produced by the United States Mint. The award contains a framed 5 certification and two bronze medals, a three-inch 6 7 Alexander Hamilton Secretary Medal, and a three-inch 8 bronze or silver medal reviewed by the CCAC typically during the member's service. Ms. Salmon asked to have 9 10 the 2022 American Liberty Silver Medal. 11 I'm pleased to present the CCAC Public 12 Service Award to Robin Salmon. Ms. Salmon 13 consistently provided inspired and thoughtful input to the development of numerous United States coins and 14 15 medals and is highly regard by her colleagues and respected for her opinions and insight. 16 17 Ladies and gentlemen, please join me in 18 thanking and congratulating Robin for her service to 19 the Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee. And, Robin, I would like to turn it over to you if you have any 20 comments you would like to make. 2.1 22 MS. WARREN: Robin, make sure if you're

MS. SALMON: All right. Thank you so much. In the beginning I thought I knew what the Citizens Coinage Advisory Committee did, but I found out that there are worlds and worlds of things beyond what I thought I knew.

This Committee has been a great joy, a great learning experience, and I am so happy to have met so many distinguished people in the field of numismatics, that of our coin design history, the list goes on and on.

And I treasure your friendship. I appreciate all of the wonderful times we shared, and I thank you again for this great honor. I look forward to continuing the friendships through the years, and if there's anything that I can ever do to help at any time, please don't hesitate to call on me.

I also want to put it on the record that everyone has a standing invitation to visit Brookgreen Gardens. We will roll out the red carpet for you. Thank you so much.

1 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Thank you, Robin. 2 I know that I, and the rest of my colleagues miss you, 3 and really wish that you could have been here in 4 person with us today. I'm confident that I speak for the CCAC 5 that we are all so happy that you joined us virtually 6 7 anyway, and to see you being honored for your service on this Committee. This is the obverse 13 and reverse candidate designs for the United States 14 Marine Corps 250th Anniversary Commemorative Coin 15 The Commemorative Coin Program was Program. 16 authorized by Public Law 118-10. 17 April Stafford and Megan Sullivan will 18 present the obverse and reverse design candidates for 19 the United States Marine Corps 250th Anniversary 20 Commemorative Coin Program. April? 2.1 Thank you. For some MS. STAFFORD: 2.2 background on this program, the United States Marines

Corps serves as the nation's premier crisis response force focusing on rapid, expeditionary deployment of air and ground units from the sea, for a wide variety of missions, from humanitarian assistance to major combat operations.

The Marine Corps traces its origins to November 10, 1775 in Philadelphia, when the Second Continental Congress resolved to raise two battalions of Marines. In 2025, the Marine Corps will celebrate its 250th Anniversary.

Following the end of the Revolutionary War, the Continental Marines, along with the Continental Navy, went out of existence, but the United States Marine Corps was reestablished on a permanent basis in 1798, and took part in many operations against the Barbary pirates on the shores of Tripoli in North Africa.

Marines took part in numerous naval operations during the War in 1812, and in the following years, protecting American interests around the world, and fought bravely during the Mexican War, all the ways to the Halls of Montezuma in Mexico City.

They served during the Civil War, the Spanish American War, the Philippine Insurrection, the Boxer Rebellion, and in numerous other places when their nation called. During World War I, the Marine Corps distinguished itself on the battlefields of France, including at Belleau Wood and in the final Meuse-Argonne offensive.

Marine Corps leaders anticipated the challenges of the next war, and innovative techniques and equipment that allowed Fleet Marine Forces to prevail in the savage amphibious assaults of World War II, necessary to cross the Pacific.

Most notable was the capture of the volcanic island of Iwo Jima, and the iconic flag raising that came to symbolize American determination in that war and ever since. Marines fought bravely in Korea and in Vietnam, leaning on their small wars heritage to focus on winning hearts and minds in the villages, while also fighting regular enemy forces in the jungles.

Marines fought with honor in major combat alongside the U.S. Army in Iraq in 1991, and

again in 2003, and is part of the sustained counterinsurgencies in Iraq and Afghanistan in the years that followed. The Marine Corps remains an important tool for U.S. foreign policy because of its ability to rapidly respond on short notice to crisis that demand a wide range of mission in peace and war.

Its excellence in these many roles has earned the reputation that there is no better friend, no worse enemy than a United States Marine. The Marine Corps prides itself on being the "First to Fight". The Marine Corps greatest asset is its people, brave men and women who choose to put service above self.

It's said that being a Marine is more than a job, it's a vocation or a calling. The Marine Corps values are "Honor, Courage and Commitment," and the official emblem, the "Eagle, Globe, and Anchor" includes a ribbon with the phrase "Semper Fidelis," meaning "Always Faithful."

This emphasis on tradition, history and culture is critical to the continued success of the Marine Corps. Designs for this program shall be

emblematic of the 250th Anniversary of the United

States Marine Corps.

In developing its candidate designs, the Mint, working with the Marine Corps Heritage

Foundation, and we are fortunate to have with us today Retired United States Marine Corps Major General James Lukeman, and President and CEO of the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation, and Jennifer Vanderveld, COO of the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation, and our liaison for this program.

Major General, Ms. Vanderveld, would you like to say a few words?

MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Thanks, April, that was awesome. I mean I'm getting all choked up when you're talking about the Marine Corps story. That was great. Good job. Thank you. Thank you everybody for letting us come here today and talk to the CCAC. Thanks for what you do. We're really excited about the opportunity for this commemorative coin set in 2025 for the Marine Corps, so thanks. Thanks for that.

Like I said, I'm General Lukeman. I

retired four years ago from the Marine Corps. And
then was fortunate enough to be brought into the
Marine Corps Heritage Foundation, which is a nonprofit
that I lead now. Ms. Jennifer Vanderveld is our COO.
She's been there for gosh, close to 20, you know, 18,
19 years now, I believe so, so she's the brain trust
for the organization.

What we do at the Marine Corps Heritage
Foundation, our mission is to preserve and share the
history, tradition, and culture of the Marine Corps,
and educate all Americans in what's best about the
Marine Corps. So that's our job is to preserve the
history, tradition, and culture.

And as you know, Marines are a little fanatical about our history. I think more so than any other service, we care about where we came from, and celebrate that. Probably the biggest accomplishment of the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation to date has been to raise the money and build the National Museum of the Marine Corps.

Has anybody here been to the National Museum of the Marine Corps yet? So it's about 45

minutes south of here, just outside of Quantico. I

f you go down 95 you'll see the

And so that was the Foundation raised the money, built that building, and still to this day it takes care of the museum, continues to improve, and that's our job is to continue to support the preservation of Marine Corps history. We do that by supporting the history division, and The President's Own Marine Corps Band, and some other programs as well.

The proceeds we get from this commemorative coin set will go to that mission. Back in 2005 the Mint minted a 230th Anniversary of the Marine Corps coin, and those proceeds had a big part in raising the money to actually build the National Museum of the Marine Corps, so thank you for that as well.

As was mentioned, what April didn't say about the Marine Corps back in 1775 when the Continental Congress decided to raise two battalions of Marines was that the first Commandant of the Marine Corps, Captain Samuel Nicholas, was charged with raising these two battalions of Marines.

So he went to the bar in Philadelphia, the Tun Tavern, and invited Marines to come to the bar, and that were not Marines, invited people to come to the bar and enlisted them in the Marine Corps. So we're very proud that the Marine Corps was born in a bar.

And to this day the museum restaurant in our museum is called Tun Tavern, which is the bar the Marine Corps was born, so we're very proud of that. And for 250 years now the Marine Corps has responded to every crisis for the country, as said from the "Shores of Tripoli to the Halls of Montezuma," and beyond, and continue to do that for the next 250 years.

This coin set is an opportunity for all Americans to be able to recognize and honor what the

April, is it time now to talk about our preferences as well?

MS. STAFFORD: Yes, sir. If you wouldn't mind.

MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Okay. Great. There they are. Good. So these are preferences for the coin. We'll talk about the gold obverse first. The image is a Color Guard of the Marine Corps, that's what we called it that, and so it's two Marines with rifles on the outside, and then carrying the American flag and the Marine Corps colors.

And this image to us represents that connection of the Marine Corps to our country, and their dress blue uniform, which is an iconic uniform, and people recognize it immediately and associate it with the Marine Corps. The Marine Corps colors have streamers on it that represent they were given to every battle and skirmish the Marine Corps has fought

in its history.

So there are hundreds of awards on the streamers that are on this set of Marine Corps colors, and it talks to that 250-year history. The silver obverse preference is the flag raising on Iwo Jima.

And it was mentioned before how iconic the photo that Joe Rosenthal took on February 23, 1945 is -- was.

But it's hard to imagine the impact it had on the country at the time. We're four years into World War II. It's not certain the outcome at this point, and that image -- I get choked up just talking about it, that image of the Marines raising the flag gave hope to the country that we're going to win this war.

And ever since then Marines have looked back on that image as this is who we are. We stand on the shoulders of these folks that overcame adversity and successfully defeated Japan in this battle, and that's the image of that. So much so, that the design of the museum as you drive down the road and you see the spire that sticks up, was designed to invoke the flag raising on Iwo Jima, so the building itself is

that image.

And anybody who sees that image that's also depicted at the War Memorial here in Arlington, instantly recognizes that's the Marine Corps, and that's what we stand for. On the clad obverse, the image is two Marines, one from 1775 and one from 2025.

And for this, it kind of invokes the mantra that every Marine is a rifleman. So you see a rifleman from 1775, a rifleman from 2025, and there's no difference, that the gear changes over the years, but the Marine hasn't changed, and it talks to that 250-year history.

So the story that I think we depict through these three coins is one of connection to country, connection to what a Marine stands for, for 250 years, and what the Marine Corps has -- and who we are in the Marines. The obverse reverse, I'm sorry. The reverse is the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor. That's the emblem of the Marine Corps since 1868.

And it was described before, everyone again as soon as you see that image you recognize it's a Marine Corps image. "The Few, The Proud," at the

bottom of the coin design just talks to our elite force. We've always been the smallest of the services, with the exception of the Space Force now, who's now smaller than us.

But we were the smallest of the services for 250 years, and it's always been a challenge to become a Marine, and so we talk about us being the "Few, the Proud, the Marines."

I'm happy to answer questions as we go through the designs, and thank you again. Like I said, we couldn't be more excited than to be able to do this program in 2025 for Marines and for Americans everywhere. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Major General, before I turn it back over to April, I do want to thank you for that very enthusiastic and heartfelt education.

MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: We're a little passionate. It just kind of gets to you, and you did a great job on that. To tell you the truth.

This again 15 is the preferred design for the gold obverse of our 16 liaisons, and there would be one requested change. 17 It would be to make at least one a 18 woman Marine to be represented in the color guard. 19 Moving on to the gold reverses. We have reverse 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. Moving on to the silver 20 2.1 obverses. We have silver obverse 1, 2, 3, 3A, 4, 4A, 22 5, 5A, 5B. This design presents a modern Marine in

the foreground with a Continental Marine in the background.

The additional inscriptions are, "250 YEARS OF HONOR, COURAGE and COMMITMENT," "USMC," and "1775," as well as of course "2025." This design again is the preferred clad obverse of our liaisons. Obverse 6, 7, 7A, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14.

Moving on to the silver reverses. We have silver reverse 1, 2, 3, 4, 5. This design displays the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor, the official emblem of the United States Marine Corps, with the additional inscription, "FEW, THE PROUD." Again, the silver reverse 5 is the preferred common reverse of our liaisons for all three coins, with of course a required denomination change. Reverse 6, 7, 9, 9, 10, and 11.

Moving on to the clad obverses. We have clad obverse 1, 3 -- this design spotlights the flag raising at Iwo Jima. Additional inscriptions include "1775" and "Marines." Again, clad obverse 3 is the preferred design for the silver obverse by our liaisons with a request to add some more detail into

1 the main imagery.

Obverse 5, 6, 7, 7A, 8, 9. Moving on to the clad reverses we have reverse 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9. And Mr. Chairman, that concludes the candidate designs.

CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: All right. Thank you very much, April. I do have one question for our liaisons. The request to add more detail to the Iwo Jima, could elaborate on that?

MS. STAFFORD: Yes. If I could just introduce that a little. In conversation it's acknowledged that it's not necessary, something that is going to be an incredible difference on the actual coin itself, but it is something that we can add into the line art to ensure that it faithfully represents the men. Correct?

MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Yeah. April got it right, it's just some small details to -- just a little more detail. When the first image came, what can we? Can we make it a little more, add something to the uniforms to make it more clear, and in that sense, it was a small detail change the way April

Thank you for that. And the designers did incredible work to create all of these designs for the Marine Corps, it's amazing. And so we had the same challenge of looking through them all and going oh my gosh, which ones do we prefer.

This image of the flag raising on Iwo

Jima, some of the reasons we preferred it was it

includes the entire flag and the staff, as opposed to
a piece of it. And several of the designs showed

portions of the flag raising, but not the entire one.

So this to us was the most recognizable image of the

flag raising on Iwo Jima from our perspective.

On the eagle, globe, and anchor, really, it was a matter of they were all a little different style, you know because their block is always the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor, but they're just different stylized versions of it. And the Marine Corps has used some of those in other things, in recruiting ads and other stuff, some of the different types of Eagle, Globe, and Anchors have been used.

The one we chose, which seemed to be 1 for us the most traditional, and the one that 2 3 everybody I think it was most recognizable as that's 4 the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor that we liked. And then 5 "the Few, the Proud," was the only change in verbiage on that one, so that would be on each coin then on the 6 7 backs of each coin. That's why we chose the one we did. 8 But you're right, the images as you look through them, 9 10 you're like okay, what about that one, or that one, 11 and it was just a preference for us. That's it. 12 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Chris Capozzola? 13 MR. CAPOZZOLA: This is Chris 14 Capozzola. I also have a question for the liaisons. 15 I think the Committee and anyone else that is listening, or the record, could benefit from a little 16 17 education about some of the phrases and their status 18 in the Marine history, and also that they're official 19 or unofficial. So then just to read out five that 20 appear that are not part of the legal requirements for 2.1 2.2 the coin. "Semper Fidelis," "Honor, Courage, and

Commitment, " "Land, Sea, Air, " "the Few, the Proud, " 1 2 and "First to Fight." So you know, and you have made 3 choices among those, and do any have the formal legal 4 status versus you know, just a traditional 5 perspective? What should we know as we think of those 6 phrases? 7 MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Great question. 8 Thank you for that. Yeah. So "Semper Fidelis" is the 9 official motto of the Marine Corps, "Always Faithful." 10 So that is official, and that's what the Marine Corps 11 "Honor, Courage and Commitment" are recognized 12 as the core values of the Marine Corps, so that's 13 official as well, "Honor, Courage and Commitment" are official. 14 15 The other three, "the Few, the Proud," 16 "First to Fight," and what was the other one? 17 "Land, Sea, Air," are more descriptions of the Marine 18 Corps that have been used in various means from a 19 bumper sticker to a saying. 20

20 is the official mascot of the Marine Corps. Chesty, I

21 think the 16th or 17th is the current bulldog mascot,

22 | lives at Marine Barracks 8th and I just down the

1 street and comes out at parades and things. The first 2 bulldog was back in 1920 when Smedley Butler brought 3 Sergeant Jiggs, was the name of that bulldog, and 4 dressed him up in a Marine Corps outfit, and he used 5 to bring it to events down there. Ever since then the bulldog has been 6 7 kind of the unofficial mascot of the Marine Corps. So 8 you have a bulldog, an English Bulldog is the mascot, 9 and that's where the bulldogs came from. 10 MR. 2006 after the coin is produced, the movie based on the book comes out, and you know, presents a more controversial message involving the photograph of that coin was -- the 2005 coin was based on. 2016 John Bradley has misidentified, and that's acknowledged.

2019 Rene Gagnon is misidentified, and that's acknowledged. There's no question right, that while it is certainly an iconic image, there's no question that the image itself and the history, how it's taken, is steeped in some controversy. And controversy is not a bad thing, you know, controversy creates discussion. Discussion creates attention and awareness.

So it's not that controversy is a bad thing, but I'd really think you're going to need to persuade us, and I'm anxious to hear your persuasiveness as to why would we restrike a coin that was minted in 2005? Why would we do that when there are so many other good designs here to choose from?

MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Thank you for that. So first on the facts. I think you've got them right on all those things, that the most interesting part of it was the misidentification of two of the original flag raisers, where you wonder how could it be that for gosh, 70 years or so, nobody came forward and said that wasn't me in that picture, or that was me in that picture?

And it kind of lends to I think the way
Marines think about the Marines in that image. We got
it right now, by the way, by examining all the
photographs and film of the whole event and looking
through the six Marines that are currently identified
as the flag raisers in that photo are correct, or at
least we think so, but we think that's correct.

But they're anonymous to most Marines.

I mean I know the names, but when you look at that picture, you know, the faces are visible, and so it can represent every Marine, or any Marine, and it's the image just stands for what Marines learned, and no Marine has ever failed at anything as long as the Marine Corps has been around, and I'm not about to be

the first.

When a Marine goes to boot camp, he's transformed. When a civilian goes to boot camp, he's transformed into a Marine. They learn about all the people that have gone before, in the battles that have gone before, and that seed of pride that's planted in every recruit stays there, which is why, you know, once a Marine always a Marine, is really a true thing.

But once you become a Marine you never -- that never leaves you, whether you serve four years or 40 years, it doesn't change. The question about restriking or having the same image on our coin in 2025 that was on the coin in 2005. We thought about that as well.

And to Marines, that image of the flag raising on Iwo Jima is the -- the iconic image of the Marine Corps, of all of them. We wanted to have iconic image is our preference was to have it, and they're all great images of the Marine Corps, the designs. They all show different things.

The drill instructor yelling, and those kinds of things, they all show different aspects of

it. But the flag raising is special. And right now
only 600,000 people have an opportunity to have one of
those from 2000, so at least 330 million Americans
that have an opportunity to get a coin with the flag
raising on it in 2025.

And I always ask them was your purpose of doing all that work to get a coin that commemorates your organization, or is your purpose to raise money? Because the two things are mutually exclusive; right? Really, it's proven when you look at the Red Book and you look at the prices, and you look at the mintages, it's proven that attractive, you know, compelling designs sell.

And the portrait coins, you know, while they might be nice to be to the issuing organization, they just don't sell, and they end up not making a terrible amount of money from it. And you know, the commemorative coin process is really to help.

You know, it's as much of a collector interest as it is to help the organization, and give you a product to sell in your shops and in your museum stores, and you know, people who visit like to buy things, and why buy junk when you can buy a United States coin in your store?

So you did a great job the first time,

and know you will do a brilliant job, you know, you're 1 2 going to make money, you can. So that, I think we're 3 all very mindful of that, and that's why your 4 recommendation definitely carries weight. I don't 5 want you think as you hear the discussion, that it doesn't. 6 7 It's acknowledged that it's very 8 respected. 9 MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Thank you for 10 And the most important thing for us is to that. 11 commemorate 250 years of the Marine Corps. Earning 12 the proceeds from it is secondary. But I think you've really done a good job explaining the connection to country tradition, history, and honor. I like the choices that you've

made, but since we're having this conversation, this 1 2 might be the time. Thank you. 3 MAJOR GENERAL LUKEMAN: Yeah. Thank 4 Lots of heroes the Marine Corps celebrates. 5 Chesty Puller being one of the most decorated Marines. He served in World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. 6 7 Others, John Lejeune, some people call him the 8 greatest Marine of all time, and so they're 9 recognizable faces that Marines would show. 10 What we wanted to portray was the 11 Marine Corps is not about one person. It's about 12 Marines. MR. CAPOZZOLA: All right. Good morning, this is Chris Capozzola, and I, like my colleague Mike Moran, I need to shuffle between some screens here, so thanks to the artists, and to the liaisons for coming up with so many ways of telling

As I was looking through this, I was guided by a couple things. I think it's very important that this be a commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the Marines, it's not just a generic sort of commemoration of the Marines as a force, and also making sure that it reflects the artistic contributions of the mint designers.

And that way I actually found myself less attracted to the images of Iwo Jima that were very specifically replications of the Joe Rosenthal photograph. I wanted to see a way in which sort of the engravers and the artists have taken that iconic image and made it something that's specific to

1 | American coinage.

And so it's a slight differential, but I actually think for the ones that actually didn't have the full flag in part because I thought it was giving me the numismatic artist little space for their creation. That said, I think I would completely support the liaison preferences if it's specific and it goes in this direction.

And I think seeing it this way helps me understand them as a series and a set, in a way in which the Iwo Jima image is one of three. And that looking across the three of them actually does convey the Marines history from 1775 to 2025. So I would just generally say that.

And let me just say maybe one or two other things, which is I could -- I wanted to draw attention to, one second. Just briefly while we're on the record, I thought the gold reverse 7, which I do not think will message our work for this coin or this series, I just want to reverse 7.

I just wanted to draw attention to it for its artistic merit, and say that that I love it

1	based on, you know, some ways which this would be a
2	great outcome for women generally to be able to think
3	about the work along the way.
4	Silver 3 obverse, silver obverse 3 is
5	one that I would like to draw a little bit of
6	attention to. All of the Iwo Jima ones, this was the
7	one that I actually was drawn to the most, and again,
8	everyone knows that's Iwo Jima, but it's not just a
9	xerox of the Rosenthal photograph, and it's very
10	specifically about the Corps and the dates who may not
11	really know it.

the Marine Corps as a whole, and not just one particular person. I think that this works very well and all of the elements that come together and are spaced together very well too.

As I move on to 4, the artfulness of the detail that's represented here, and just looking at the way that they Marines are those represented behind the line. But I have to agree to that looking for different designs in order to represent the whole of what the Marine Corps is are important, but there's something about the way that each of these just approach this very, very well.

And it's something that, especially with the walls down behind the flag also I also C2. For the obverse I think that my favorite was 14, and once again it's also because of spacing, the way that each of the elements are positioned, and thinking about the way this would look on the coin overall.

The shading here, especially the grading is detailed expertly, and I think it represents the globe and the anchor very well, something that it is instantly recognizable to others,

1 and also has that dynamic look over all of the

2 | elements. I'm excited to see how this would look in

3 person with all of the recessing and detailed shading

4 here as well.

Collectors love errors; right? They're all collecting the packaging replacements that the Mint has been sending out, so there's a whole market for the error packaging; right?

So and people like that, collectors collect, and you know, it certainly becomes a talking point, you know. I'm sure Coin World will have a -- you know, will have some articles about the, you know, a restrike coin.

And collectors, you know, it might really, you know, create an aftermarket for the 2005 coin, so I go back and forth on this, right? And I don't really know what the right answer is, and I don't see. And there are interesting other designs here, and you are, you know, this is not you, I'd be wanting to talk about some other designs.

But to keep to my five minutes, the important point that I really -- the important comment at the risk of sounding like Sean Parker in the

Facebook movie when he turns to Mark Zuckerberg and says, "Drop the thought," right? You know, a great scene, and you know, at risk of sounding like him, you know, I'm just wondering you know if you know, the objective of what you're trying to do with the gold coin is clearly flags, right?

2.1

Because you realize the people are going to look like mosquitoes, you know, on the size of the planchet, you're not going to really, the people are like, you know. So honestly, if it were me, I would drop the people, and I would, you know, just start with the flags.

Start with the flagpole and the flags and highlight the flags because the people are I think just going to give you gas. I mean I think you're going to have, you know, it could go the way of the basketball coin, you know, where we had to have, you know, every conceivable group represented because this is kind of what we do these days.

You know, and you're going to get criticism you know, with it unless you diversify this group. You'll probably get criticism with the coin,

and you know. And you know, the coin itself, the gold coin, they just don't, you know, people are right now, especially people are spending a lot of money on the gold coins. So it's not going to be your best seller coin, you know, to begin with.

And it could give you grief if you don't really change the images, even though you're never going to be able to see the faces without, you know, without a five time or a three-time magnification. So my recommendation on the gold is just drop the people. Just if you really want the flag, do the flags.

The flags, you know, would make a good, you know, would make, you know, would fill a gold coin, the small size of the gold coin much better.

And the alternative to that is what Mike had suggested, is to go with obverse 6, which would make a striking gold coin, right? Because the object, when you go into the gold coin that small size, you really need one compelling image.

And when you look at the, you know, when you look at the sales figures of a lot of these

things, you know, on the theory that you know, pretty 1 2 coins sell, others don't, others sell less. You know, 3 having I mean that's a compelling -- that will fill 4 the planchet. That design would fill the planchet. 5 So I would recommend either going, and we can do that by motion if the Committee likes the 6 7 flag, and likes the idea of killing people, right, you 8 know, we could always do that by motion, you know, which is a simple thing. 9 10 We could certainly hear from the 11 engraver, but I would want you to think about that, 12 and maybe come back to you with a question before we 13 vote to see how you feel about that; right? 14 Because that would persuade me to give 15 you the flag instead of going -- instead of me, 16 personally going for voting for obverse 6, which would 17 be a prettier, a nicer, a more appealing gold coin, so 18 that's actually I was very concise, so. 19 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Very, thank you. Dennis Tucker? 20 2.1 Thank you, Mr. Chair. MR. TUCKER: 2.2 General Lukeman, thank you for your presentation, and

this is very helpful. I understand your choices. I appreciate them, and they have my support.

Donald, you always bring up interesting ideas. I think, if I'm not mistaken, the concept of the color guard, and you have the colors, which are the flags, and then you have the guard, which are the people.

So the color guard which is depicted here would not be complete if we didn't have both, and that would be one point. A second point would be if you look at the gold coins, the gold five dollar coins that the United States Mint has made in recent years.

For example, the 2019 American Legion five dollar gold, the minute amount of detail on these coins is exquisite, and you can really get a lot of very intricate detail into the small canvas.

I'm not saying that we're going to have super detailed portraits, but I do think it's enough to warrant keeping those four figures in the design, and I also think it's important to have that diversity in the female member of the color guard as well.

When I reviewed these designs, this

incredible portfolio, one of my first questions was, and I've rethought this, but I just want to give you this background. I thought we have an opportunity to have three different reverses because we have three different coins. So and I felt at first that we're not

Hi. John Saunders here. MR. SAUNDERS: In thinking about the question, Donald, about whether we should repeat an image again or not. I think there are certain images that both from a sales point of view, and for just commemorative things are so iconic that not bad to repeat them.

I mean the Iwo Jima image was one. As a kid I was a stamp collector, as well as a coin

collector. And there's a three-cent stamp with the

Iwo Jima on it, and that was always one of my favorite

stamps, one of the first ones I got in my collection

of the older things.

And I think this image that just cries out to be on there, particularly when we get a three coin set. If we only had one coin maybe there's a reason not to repeat the same thing as the gold coin from before, but we have three of them. We're only putting Iwo Jima on one of the three coins.

So I don't really have a problem with that now. Of course I liked the buffalo yesterday, and I got shutdown on the buffalo on the coin for the repeat image. And I think the buffalo is iconic to the point where I still like the buffalo, but okay.

So I'm going to support the requested and recommended images, but I also want to point out, and it will be up to our Chairman as to how we do this, I kind of like the idea of scoring the images, even though I'm not voting for them because I want to go with the program.

But I think it would be useful to score

the images for feedback to artists and so forth, as well as rather than being we're voting for it to put on the coin.

And I also want to give a shoutout for on the gold coin, number 6. I agree with Mike there. I mean that one is the one that struck me when I was looking at it before I heard the recommendation.

And I still like that one a little bit better than the color guard, but so it's pretty complicated with different reverses for different reverses, but you know using different denominations designs. Voting on it would be hard to do that, so I'm going to vote with the program as recommended, but I do think that that's a great design.

CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: John, to answer your question, I would welcome a recommendation, or a motion to support the liaisons choices before we score them. We will score nonetheless because we do need to have the scores just for the record, and also for the sake of the artists and so forth. So once we're finished with the discussion that could be a possibility.

MR. SAUNDERS: Okay. I don't remember 1 2 who else -- but other than yourself. 3 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: We have Kellen. 4 MR. SAUNDERS: Okay. Well, the motion 5 will come later. CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: All right. 6 Thank 7 you. Kellen? 8 MR. HOARD: Thank you. This is Kellen 9 Hoard. For me, I think you avoid the problem of the 10 restrike concept, like you said. I agree that the Iwo Jima image should not be on the silver dollar, and you 11 12 do it on either the clad or the gold. And I'll get 13 more into that in a second, but I'll just start with 14 the gold to make things kind of easier to track. 15 On the gold I'm not usually somebody who has a huge issue with sizing on the gold in a 16 17 small piece. I look at it as I think detail shows up. 18 But I think it's an opportunity to be bold. 19 All the gold coins that are I think, artistically compelling, but I think take advantage of 20 2.1 the size and the medium, are the ones that have a have 2.2 the striking immediate bold design, and I don't feel

that 9 is quite as compelling and striking as it could be, especially relative to some other ones in the portfolio.

I found among the gold, observe 4 actually quite striking and bold, something that takes advantage of the size and speaks out to you from that small piece. I think it really holds that well, and I would appreciate, and I think it doesn't raise a problem with replicating on the silver dollar if you do it on the gold five dollar.

I think it's a piece that will pop off the five dollar. I also found 6 quite compelling. I know the liaisons want to avoid a specific person, but that's one that pops of the five dollar coin. That is taking advantage of the medium of the coinage and of the gold piece and silver.

I'll get to reverses in a little while, but let's go to silver. On silver no one liked this one, but I did. I liked 1A quite a bit. I thought that was a nice one. I'm not sure it will get my vote, but I'll give it points, 1A there. You know, combine some pieces with the Iwo Jima image with some

But again, largely I'm disinclined to go for the Iwo Jima image here because I think there's opportunities. And I'll say that as they addressed it, again the young person on the Committee, a lot of young people who are interested in knowing about the history of the Marines in a lot of these pieces. They're buying the clad coin, not the silver one.

And so, if this is the image you really want to emphasize, I would honestly look at putting it on the clad coin because you're going to get a huge base of people who maybe aren't even those passionate collectors, but the general public is going to be going for that one. That's the one I would really emphasize if that's the image you want to share.

And so either the 4A in gold or the 3 series with the silver, which we should talk about as well, and I think Chris probably mentioned it as well. But that is a way to kind of bring any of those three series if we want to click down, or actually I think -- well, this is silver. Sorry this is silver.

But this is kind of a new dynamic, exciting way as Chris mentioned, to show this image in a way that's unique to the medium as popping and exciting, and I think the clad coins don't get their due with kind of exciting designs like this one that show a different angle vantage point.

So I would recommend this one for again, maybe the clad if we're going to go with Iwo Jima on there. I was actually quite excited about that one. Also 4 for the silver obverse, again that's another one that really had pops, and if you're going to put that on the clad. It's exciting for what the public would get behind.

It's remarkable when they're excited, they get the image, they get the iconography, and you

avoid the replication issue. For clad just I'm not going to vote for artistic merit why I thought clad 6 was just kind of a neat design for clad obverse 6.

All right. That's a long PDF. Yeah.

I just thought that was a neat one, and I wanted to shout that one out, I'll give points to the artist for that one. So really where I'd land is that I think, you know, with the silver you go with one of the alternative designs that's not Iwo Jima. Maybe you go with the one alternative, the clad design through time.

Maybe you go with some of the other images, but then Iwo Jima on the gold or the clad, and do a popping design on the gold. That's the one that has the kind of Marines in the bold lettering, or has the design 6 as well, which really placed the medium.

And then I think you -- for the reverse I'm fine, you know, with kind of the simple one, but I think on that one you also go -- you get a little bit of flavor in there as well.

You can stick, I mean on the 2005 coin it was again a very simple plain one. And I think we

I really liked silver image obverse 12 with the Sergeants encouraging those, a great deal of encouragement in that case. I know that also was a compelling image, and certainly something we have never seen on the U.S. coinage before.

But again, I am more than happy to support the liaison's preferences in this portfolio. Donald, do you have quick comment?

MR. SCARINCI: I was going to make a motion.

And but, if you put it on the clad, even the half a million people that own the silver might want to buy the clad as a companion piece to the silver from 2005. So from a sale point of view not only do we overcome the restrike because it's not really a restrike, it's a different thing, so you overcome any issue of that.

But you know, you go back to the half a million people that own the first coin, and you've got the clad coin now versus putting it on the gold because the gold, the golds don't have a history of selling more than, you know, 15 or 20,000, you know 20,000 coins.

And I don't know that that design is going to increase that very much beyond maybe 20,000. So I just think Kellen made a good point, it's worth

discussing, and maybe if you don't mind. I think --1 2 and I would like here before we vote, I'd really like 3 to hear their comments, the liaisons comments on our 4 comments to hear what they have to say. 5 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Perfect. As this coin -- and equally so, it's a different interpretation by the actors and the directors, and in this case that would be the sculptor. The sculptural interpretation that we would be able to visit upon this script now, as it goes to 20 years ago, is definitely more sophisticated. I'm not talking about digital technology.

I'm talking about the quality of our sculpting now is probably the best since Gilroy Roberts, the chief engraver. We have the best staff in the world right now.

You will have a much richer, and joyful visually obviously different and more powerful sculpture than we did despite the fact that I think that was the coin of the year actually, that Charles Vickers, that Norman Nemeth sculpted.

1 Norm and Charlie did the obverse and 2 But you will have the same script, but 3 you'll have a different version of that, you'll have a 4 different interpretation of it. I think it's really 5 important to consider the sculptor voices where only the Committee is not limiting two potential designs 6 7 with a numerous amount of coin understanding behind 8 I'm not invalidating that, please, or making an 9 assumption. 10 But from a sculptor's perspective, I 11 know we can make this pop, and it would be fantastic, 12 and it will honor the service people that it's meant 13 to in a brand new way, even though like when two 14 different bands play the same song, it's not really 15 the same. 16 Jimi Hendrix's Star-Spangled Banner 17 sounds completely different, right? He actually 18 invested in it, and made it a whole new work of art, 19 but it's the same song. Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Joe, thank you 2.1 very much. Always appreciate your insights. voters, numismatist scholars, and people in the 1 2 industry. And it wasn't until seven years later after this coin that the United States won another coin of 3 4 the year, so this is the last one for a long, long time. 5 So there is no question this is an 6 7 iconic design, it's an important coin, it's an 8 important design, and thank you, Joe, for that 9 insight. I hadn't really thought of that, but you're 10 absolutely right. It's going to be a different coin. 11 And numismatists will identify the difference and 12 enjoy doing it. 13 So as to the motion I'm probably going to -- me and John, we're going to probably vote 14 15 against it because I want to score first. 16 MR. SAUNDERS: Well, I wouldn't feel I 17 did it right if you voted for it. 18 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: All right. And 19 let's if there are no further comments on the motion, Dennis? You have one? 20 2.1 MR. It features a portrait of 11 Secretary Yellen, along with the inscription "JANET 12 YELLEN." 13 Reverse 4 depicts a view of the 14 Treasury Building and the inscription "78TH UNITED 15 STATES SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY." 16 CHAIRMAN VAN ALFEN: Thank you very 17 much. Since this is a very small portfolio, with 18 really only one obverse and one reverse design, I do 19 not think that we need to spend five minutes each discussing this. So what I would suggest is if there 20 2.1 are any comments or observations that might improve 2.2 the designs, I'd certainly welcome those comments and

1 discussion. And I see Dennis has his hand raised. 2 MR. TUCKER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I just wanted to bring attention to the reverse, and 3 4 specifically the wording and the modifiers. "United States and Secretary of the Treasury." Traditionally, 5 the Secretary medals have, for example for Secretary 6 7 Lew, it was the 76th Secretary of the Treasury. For Secretary Mnuchin, it was 77th 8 9 Secretary of the Treasury. I think we have misplaced 10 modifiers here, and this should either be 78th 11 Secretary of the United States Treasury, or simply 12 following the traditional wording, which would be 78th 13 Secretary of the Treasury. The way it's worded now there is an 14 15 implication that there are other Secretaries of the 16 Treasury, and she happens to be the United States 17 Secretary of the Treasury. 18 MS.
